
Mappers Notes

The *University of Bath* campus is on Claverton Down, east of Bath city centre. *Google Earth* shows the campus in high resolution while *Street View* allows you to view much of the site photographically. The campus is very detailed, so M/W65+ maps will be enlarged to 1:3000, while all other courses will be 1:4000 scale at A4 size. Contours are at 2m intervals and symbols are ISSOM2007.

The site slopes downwards from north to south, with landscaped spoil heaps from past construction works adding contour detail. The University's central complex includes a large elevated public space 'The Parade' overlying a service zone. Because of the sloping terrain, 'The Parade' is at ground level on its northern edge, but is reached by stairs or ramps on other sides.




Access to the service zone underneath is by stairs to the north but its southern, eastern and western entrances are at ground level. There are 10 possible entry or exit points to this lower service zone and legs across the central University area therefore offer both vertical and horizontal route choices. Light-wells cut through the upper level illuminate the lower level. To define the elevated areas, upper-level paved areas open to the sky throughout the campus have been mapped using 40% brown. The usual paler 20% brown specifies a ground-level paved area. Tall buildings overlie parts of *'The Parade'* and the grey 'canopy' symbol is used to indicate routes below these tower blocks. The service zone is used to store equipment but individual storage bays have not been mapped, and there may be parked vehicles. Controls will not be sited within the lower service zone.

Western terrace & light-wells

The service road runs from A to C and continues to the east. The boundaries of the lower service zone are

indicated by black 'underpass' dots highlighted against the dark grey of overlying buildings by purple lines edged with white. The access points to the service zone are shown bordered by straight purple lines rather than the ISSOM curved symbol as curved lines nearby obscure features. Where you can move into a light-well in the service zone, these purple lines cut the solid black line of the boundary wall on the level above. The map also shows two temporary fenced builders' compounds (thicker purple lines).



Buildings within the service zone are mapped with dashed black lines, bordered by purple. These buildings do not match structures on the terrace above and you may be able to cross over the top of them. On the western map segment:

- You can use the lower service zone to move from A, via E1 to D.
- Passing underneath buildings you can move from A to B or to either the external stairs S2 to the north or to the covered staircase S1, which links the Service to the 'Parade' level.
- In this part of the map the upper 'Parade' is mostly covered by higher buildings and its passageways are marked in grey, but there is an open area (40% brown) in the eastern part of the extract. On the upper level, you can move freely between R (a ramp hence the form line), and points Q & T. You


can leave this part of 'The Parade' to the north, east and west, but not to the south unless you change levels via S1.

Eastern terrace and light wells

The eastern part of 'The Parade' is more open and the service zone below is wider. To move northwards you may either climb the stairs to 'The Parade' (yellow routes), or enter the lower Service zone (blue routes). The blue routes deviate around a building in the lower zone, but this building is not visible on 'The Parade' and you may cross above it. Raised vegetation beds (dark green) within the light-wells obstruct direct routes across the light-wells.

Other features

Sliding Doors: At the west end of The Parade there are two sets of doors (one automatic) that will be clearly marked and through which you may pass; all other doorways are out of bounds.



Handrails: Sloping paths have handrails to assist disabled visitors; these are shown as 'crossable fences' and you can vault or duck underneath them.

Undergrowth and planting: There are several wooded areas. Areas marked as green forest or undergrowth should be avoided. Staying on the paths reduces the risk of ending up in thick nettles or brambles. Landscape features mapped in dark green or olive colours must not be crossed even if it is physically possible to do so, and offenders may be disqualified.

Trees: Trees marked with a green circle have a circumference greater than about 2m, those marked with a green dot have smaller trunks.

Smaller features

Black circles with a dot in the centre mark sculptures. Easily moved features including wooden benches and picnic tables are not mapped. Tower floodlights and the main University chimney (currently being demolished) have also been omitted as their symbols obscure nearby features.

Temporary features (mapped in mauve)

The gardeners constantly plant, prune and fell. Six major construction projects are in progress and their boundary fences often change. In addition, summer maintenance works affect several areas. The map has been updated to the latest possible time, but competitors should expect to find some changes.
